HUNDREDS OF PUPPIES, ONE DEPARTMENT

GDA Puppy Department Keeps Track of More than 250 Puppies

One day, the GDA Puppy Department will be sending home 8-week-old puppies with their volunteer puppy raisers. The next day may be a "turn in" day when several puppies, all of them about 18 – 24 months old, return to GDA; their puppy raisers leaving them at the school to begin formal guide dog training.

"It's a full circle with all of our puppies," said Puppy Department Manager Louise Henderson, who has been in the department for 21 of her 22 years at GDA. "We place our puppies with one of our puppy raisers and we oversee them until they come in for formal training. We're here to help the puppy raisers. Their success contributes to

the success of our program."

On average, GDA sends home 20 litters every year to live with puppy raisers. That translates to more than 250 puppiesin-training at any given time being prepared for the career they were bred and born to do. Louise and Puppy Department Assistant Manager Yvonne Martin are there every step of the way doing everything they can to ensure the success of the puppies-in-training.

One of the ways they do that is with puppy testing. At seven weeks old, every puppy is tested to gauge its temperament and personality. "We give the puppies a retrieval test to see if they are willing to please. We put a puppy on its back to see if he is dominant or shy. To see if he is sensitive to sound, we'll rattle coins in a can," explained Louise. If we see a puppy is very shy, we will place him or her with a puppy raiser who may have previously had success with a similar-type puppy and can work to bring out its potential."

Along the way, the Puppy Department keeps track of each puppy's progress with monthly basic obedience classes held at the school, scheduled testing to determine if a puppy is on track with its training, puppy raiser meetings, home visits and answering calls from puppy raisers.

"Most of our calls come from puppy raisers during the first few weeks the puppy is home with them," said Yvonne. "We help them through everything from housebreaking to crate-training to biting... puppy stuff. If it's a more difficult problem, we will go out to the puppy raiser's house to help them resolve the issue."

Yvonne has been in the Puppy Department for five years, but she has been a GDA employee for 10 years. She began her career as a

Licensed Instructor and has used that experience to build the curriculum for the monthly obedience and "issues management" classes held at GDA. These days are broken into three sessions, with classes tailored to the various ages and stages of puppyhood – 8 weeks to four months, five – 11 months, and one year and up.

"We work on issues that are typical to a particular age range. For young puppies it's biting. When the puppies reach about five months, jumping can become a problem," said Yvonne. "During each class, we spend time on behavior and basic obedience with time for questions and answers at the end."

Louise and Yvonne manage the puppy department but are quick to admit they couldn't manage without the hundreds of dedicated volunteer puppy raisers. "Our puppy raisers are incredible," said Louise. "We have dozens of families that have raised more than 10 puppies and a few that have raised as many as 20. That is dedication."

The Puppy Department circle begins when Louise and Yvonne prepare to send the puppies home with their puppy raisers, and continues until graduation day.

"The happiest day for us is puppy placement day. It never gets old. All of the puppies have their own personalities," said Louise. "Turn-in day is one of the most emotional times for the puppy raisers but it's a mixture of emotions. They are sad to see their dog go but anxious to see if it makes it through formal training. The most emotional day of all is graduation day. That is the day the circle is complete."

One thing that remains the same however, is the undeniable fact that the puppy raisers are the backbone of this organization. These volunteer puppy raisers are amazing people. They are given an eight-week-old puppy and are asked to return a well-mannered and well-acclimated 18-month-old-dog. This dog has become a part of their family and yet they willingly give the dog back so that it can serve the blind community. The puppy and the family go through a lot during this 16-month period. There are shoes and furniture to be chewed, obedience classes to attend, vet checks to go through and the constant evaluations of the puppy and its progress.

When you meet a puppy raiser at one of the many fundraising events, thank them. Guide Dogs of America could not produce this quality of dogs without them.

We are planning some changes to the format of our website. A fresh new approach to our communications is in the works. We hope you like it and hope that you will give us your feedback.

VET'S CORNER

An Ounce of Prevention

Canine vaccines and vaccination play important roles in disease prevention and can save lives of young puppies. The purpose of canine vaccination is to stimulate a dog's body to produce antibodies (germ-fighting proteins made by specialized white blood cells) and "memory" cells, so that if the dog ever encounters the disease again, his system will be primed and ready to defend against it.

In your puppy's first year, your vet will administer vaccinations to prevent the following diseases:

- Canine Distemper Caused by a virus closely related to the human measles virus, it is considered the most serious viral disease of dogs.
- Canine Hepatitis A disease of the liver and other body organs caused by canine adenovirus type 1 (CAV-1).
- Canine Parainfluenza A highly contagious respiratory disease that contributes to upper respiratory disease and infection such as tracheobronchitis.
- Canine parvovirus type 2 (CPV-2) A highly contagious and serious disease caused by a virus that attacks the gastrointestinal tract of puppies and dogs.
- Rabies Invariably fatal disease that affects all warm-blooded animals (including huma ns).
- Bordetella One of the three most common causes of Canine Upper Respiratory Disease Complex, known as "Kennel Cough."

The following is the vaccination schedule recommended by the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA) and the California Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA). This is a list of "core" vaccinations that should be administered during your puppy's first year:

6 weeks: DHPP (Distemper, Hepatitis,

Parainfluenza, Parvovirus)

7 weeks: Bordetella 9 weeks: DHPP 12 weeks: DHPP

16 weeks: DHPP and Rabies 20 weeks: DHPP and Bordetella 1 year: DHPP, Rabies and Bordetella

After one year, the CVMA recommends the DHPP and Rabies vaccinations be given every three years. Bordetella should be given yearly unless boarding, then it should be given every three months.

Depending on the age, breed and health of your dog, as well as the potential for the dog to be exposed to the disease and the geographic area where the dog lives or may visit, your vet may recommend additional vaccinations, including Leptospirosis, Giardiasis, Lyme Disease and Coronavirus. These are not considered "core" vaccines and are given at the veterinarian's and owner's discretion. Talk with your veterinarian to determine the appropriate vaccination schedule for your dog.

By properly vaccinating your dog, you are helping to ensure his health and safety as well as that of other

pets and humans.
