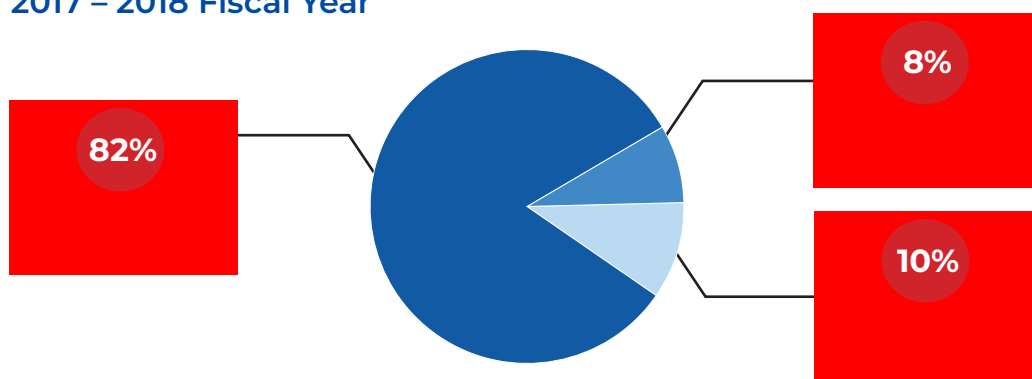


OUR UPDATED MISSION STATEMENT

Training Videos: Canine Development team created videos for puppy raisers to supplement training classes.

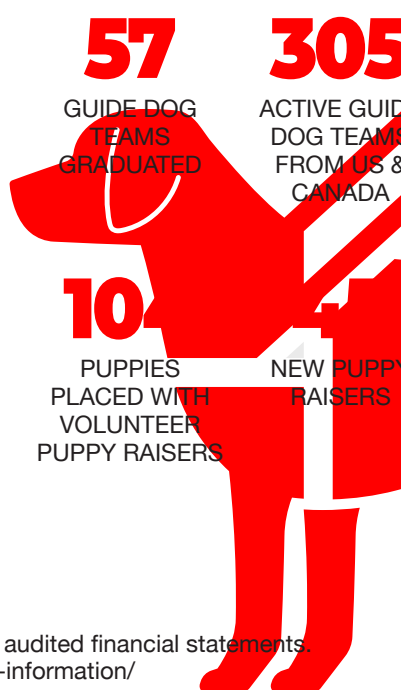
Saturday Class Returns: with fun topics like airport simulation, puppy stretching, and a practice visit to the vet.

Derek has become quite an accomplished surfer and he attributes his success in large part to faith and trust – both of which he also has in his new guide dog, Serenity. **"She gives me much more freedom and mobility to go where I want to go. She gives me a lot of confidence and I trust her."**
